Cav and was personally well acquainted with Claimant Bowles several years before his enlistment in said company and at date of same about august 4th 1862 Never Knew Claimant afflicted in any way with ant diseases Know he was especially free from diseases of head partial deafness of both Ears neck Jaws and affected teeth After clai-mant Enlisted in said Company he continued Sound & free from diseases or inJuries and able for active duty and always???? his duty cheerfull when detailed uptil about the 15 of July 1863 at Camp near Irvine Ky Said Claimant Contract bilious fever Severe attach Affiant recollection is that Claimant remained in his tent Some four or five days With said fever and was

treated By asst Surgeon **James W. Hensley** Claimant was then sent to field Hospital Located at Camp near Irvine Ky and was still treated by assistant Surgeon **Hensley** uptil about 30<sup>th</sup> July 1863 Claimant complained with his head appeared to be somewhat hard of hearing

He also complained with his neck Jaws and teeth while he was suffering with Said fever in Hospital while under Surgeon Hensley treatment uptil about 30th July 1863 On said day and year our Regiment was attacked by the enemy and retreated to Booneville Ky leaving Claimant back behind Sick with said fever and complaining with Said diseases described & located in this affidavit affiant then lost Sight of Claimant till he got able to report himself to Camp Located near Booneville in the first part of August 1863 He then was very weak & feble not able for any duty Still complaining with his head Somewhat hard of hearing in conversations he was also complaining with neck Jaws & teeth Said Claimant from that time on was excused from all hard Soldier duty by reason of Said Complaints and diseases named above uptill Discharged from Said Service March 24th 1864 at Camp Nelson Ky. affiant further states that Said fever was caused from Cold and exposure While in a line of his duty in the United States Service Affiant Says he believes that Said fever resulted in Said diseases he complained with named above till he was discharged date given above Affiant says he has Saw Claimant frequintly Since the Service and he has at the times Still complained with head and appeared Somewhat hard of hearing in conversations unless they be lould Has also complained with neck Jaws & teeth Hurting him to date Affiant Says he knows the facts about his condition before he entered the Service from personal acquaintance in the Service at the time he taken fever I results from Personal Knowledge from being present at the time I place and being an eye witness and continuing first Sergeant of Said company till discharged Since the Service from acquaintance Affiant further declares that he has no interest direct or inderect in the Prosecution of this Claim for Pension and not related to Claimant

Commissioner of Pensions Dear Sir, in answer to your letter of enquiry in the pension claim Washington D.C. of James M Bowles that I testified in about the month of apr/89. About the month of July/63 I first became aware of Clamant sickness at Camp near Ervine Ky. He taken sick with fever believe it was bilious fever [typhus] he was attacked with. He remained in his tent a few days while sick. In his tent he complaned with his head ears neck jaws and teeth. After a few days he was sent to the hospital located at said place still complaining with his head ears neck jaws and teeth. I was sent to the same Hospital. while we remaned together in the same hospital he was affected in head ears neck jaws and teeth until the 30th day of July/63. On that day our regiment was attacked by the enemy. Claimant and affiant was moved from hospital both of us very sick to an old steam mill on the

river for safety from the enemy. We remaned in said steam mill very sick for two or three days. Clamiant suffered while there with his head ears neck jaws and teeth. We then made an effert and did start home being by our selves. the regiment had left went in the direction of Booneville Ky. We went to our homes in owsley co Ky after several days slow travel. Claimant complained all the time on our way home with head ears. Appeared somewhat hard of hearing in conversations. he complained with his neck hurting him jaws and teeth. Claimant went to his home & I went to my home. I lost sight of Claimant till we got able to return to our regiment. There in camp near Booneville Ky About the first part of august 1863 I met with claimant there. His condition was still bad not able for duty. Still complaining with his head ears neck jaws & teeth. Somewhat hard of hearing in talking with him. he was kept off all hard duty from that time untill discharged by reason of said complaint he was affected with and suffered from till discharged from service about March 24th 1864 at Camp Nelson in the state of Ky. I believe said diseases above named was the results of said fever he suffered with. he was treated while in his tent and in Hospital till about July  $30^{th}$  1863 by asst surgeon James W. Hensley for said fever and its results or affects on him. I know all the above facts stated from my own personal knowledge from the sources stated in affiavit on file in his case.

I am 44 years of age; My post-office address Ammie, Clay Co. Ky. Merchant & Post master of Ammie Ky

I have known this claimant well for about the past eight or ten years, She has lived right in this neighborhood within from 1 to 2 miles of me. I knew her late husband **James M. Bowles**.

He was killed near here about three or four years ago. Claimant and her husband usually lived

together but there was a period of some three months they separated for some cause unknown but they were living together at the time he was killed. They were never divorced that I ever knew or heard of.

Since Mr. Bowles death this claimant has lived within about 1 1/4 miles of me and I know she has never remarried or lived with any man as his wife or otherwise. At least I never heard of such a thing and it seems to me living right here in the neighborhood I would have known it had such a thing occurred. There was some report that some of claimants girls were not just right, but I don't know this of my own knowledge but as far as claimant is concerned I never heard a thing against her character.

Not related nor interested.
