The court then proceeded to the trial of <u>Corporal Elisha Thomas</u>, <u>Co. D 7<sup>th</sup> R egt. K y. Vols.</u> who was called before the court and having heard the order appointing the court read, was asked if he had any objection to any member named in the order.

The accused having no objection to any member the court was then in his presence duly sworn by the judge advocate and the judge advocate was duly sworn by the president of the court.

The accused appealed to the court to be permitted to introduce **Major E. B. Treadway** as his counsel, which application was granted and he appeared as counsel for the accused.

The accused, <u>Corporal Elisha Thomas Co D. 7<sup>th</sup> Ky. Vols.</u> was arraigned on the following charge and specification.

Charge – – Mutiny

Specification – I n this, that he Elisha Thomas, Corporal Co. D 7th Regt. Ky. Vols. I nftry, did on or about the night of the 5th Febuary 1864, join in mutiny with other men of said Regt. and said that if he (Thomas) could get men to help him, that he would engage in pulling up a post, where a man of the 7th Regt. Ky. Vol. I nfty. was then tied by order of the commander of said Regt: this at B aton Rouge La.

To which charge and specification the accused pleaded as follows.

To the Specification: - Not Guilty.
To the Charge: - Not Guilty.

**Private Silas** Wilder, Co. D 7<sup>th</sup> Ky. Vols. a witness for the prosecution was called and sworn.

### Examination in Chief.

<u>Question</u>: – Were you present at a riot in your regiment on or about the 5<sup>th</sup> of Febuary instant?

A nswer: - I was.

<u>Question</u>: — State what you know of said riot and of the connection of the accused with the same

A nswer: — The boys all went to the post and came back; we were trying to hush them up, accused kept on talking. Capt Clarke told him he would reduce him if he did not shut up. The accused told him he could reduce when he got ready, the post would be taken up. I heard a good deal, but I don't know who was talking, that was all I heard the accused say. I did not see any one touch the post, they were all gathered round the post and said it should be taken up, they did not think it was right for it to be there.

<u>Capt. H. D. Clark Co. D 7<sup>th</sup> Ky. Vols.</u> a witness for the prosecution was called and sworn.

# Examination in Chief.

<u>Question</u>: – Were you present at any riot in your regiment on or about the  $5^{th}$  of Feby. instant?

A nswer: - I was.

<u>Question</u>: — State what you know of said riot and of the connection of the accused with the same.

Answer: — On or about the 5<sup>th</sup> instant there was a man tied to a post which caused considerable excitement in camp, soldiers from different companies concluded to release the man; at evening roll call I had heard Something of this thing and I told my men not to engage in it for they would be severely punished. Corporal Thomas stated that the man ought never to have been tied to the post and he was willing to pull the post up or help do it. I told him as he was a non-commissioned officer, instead of trying to induce others to go into it, he ought to try to keep it down. He replied that he had not tried to induce any others to go into it, but was willing to help take it up himself.

Prosecution closed here.

The defence having no testimony to offer, the court was then closed for deliberation and after mature consideration of the evidence adduced, find the accused <u>Corporal Elisha Thomas Co D. 7<sup>th</sup> Ky Vols.</u> as follows,

<u>Of the Specification</u>. Guilty

Of the Charge. Guilty and do therefore sentence him Corporal Elisha Thomas Co D. 7<sup>th</sup> Ky Vols. to be reduced to the ranks and confined on Ship I sland Miss. to hard labor on government fortifications for one year.

The court then adjourned to meet again tomorrow at 9 O'clock A.M. Geo. W. Moners

The court then proceeded to the trial of <u>Corporal Harrison Frances</u> <u>Co. D 9<sup>th</sup> K y. Vol. I nfty.</u>, who was called before the court and having heard the order appointing the court read, was asked if he had any objection to any member named in the order.

The accused having no objection to any member, the court was then, in his presence duly sworn by the judge advocate, and the judge advocate was duly sworn by the president of the court.

The accused applied to the court to be permitted to introduce **Major E. B. Treadway**  $7^h$  K y. Vols. as his counsel, which application was granted, and he appeared as counsel for the accused.

The accused, <u>Corporal Harrison Frances</u>, <u>Co. D 7<sup>th</sup> K y.</u>
<u>Vols.</u> was arraigned on the following charge and specification.

<u>Charge</u>. – <u>Mutiny</u>

Specification. In this, that he <u>Harrison Frances</u>, <u>Corp. Co. D</u>  $\underline{\mathcal{I}}^{th} \, \underline{R} \, \underline{egt}. \, \underline{K} \, \underline{y}. \, \underline{Vols}. \, \underline{I} \, \underline{nfty}$ , did join in and excite mutiny in an attempt to tear down a post, set in the ground to tie offenders against military order and discipline, against the orders of his commander and the commanding officer of the Regiment and that after the commander of said  $all \, \underline{f}^{th} \, \underline{K} \, \underline{y}. \, \underline{Vol}. \, \underline{I} \, \underline{nfty}$ , had stationed a guard to protect said post, he remarked "get your guns boys, and lets tear it down"; all this at  $\underline{B} \, \underline{aton} \, \underline{R} \, \underline{ouge} \, \underline{L} \, \underline{a}. \, \underline{Feby} \, \underline{6}^{th} \, \underline{1864}$ 

To which charge and specification the accused pleaded as follows:

To the <u>Specifications</u> <u>Not Guilty</u>

# To the <u>Charge</u> <u>Not Guilty</u>

**Sergt**. **Jesse B**. **Boling** Co. B  $\underline{f}^{th}$  Ky. Vols. a witness for the prosecution was called and sworn. –

### Examination in Chief.

- <u>Question</u>. Were you present at any riot or disturbance in your regiment on or about the 5<sup>th</sup> of Febuary instant?
- A nswer: I was present.
- <u>Question</u>: State what you know of said riot and of the connection of the accused with the same.
- <u>A nswer</u>: The accused said to the boys "come ahead and lets take down the post." There was a crowd out there, I did not see them do anything; just threatening was all I heard. I heard none of the crowd, only him. I have stated all I heard him say.

### Cross Examination

- <u>Question</u>: How long have you known the accused?
- <u>A nswer</u>: I have known him ever since we have been in the service, two years and five or six months.
- <u>Question</u>: What has been his military character since you have known him?
- <u>A nswer</u>: I have always taken him to be a straight forward, nice boy up to this time.
- <u>Question</u>: Has the accused been generally in good health and ready for duty or not?
- A nswer: To the best of my knowledge he has.
  - <u>L ieut</u>. <u>Melvin Phelps Co.</u> <u>C 7<sup>th</sup> K y. Vols.</u> a witness for the prosecution was called and sworn.

# Examination in Chief

- <u>Question</u>: Were you present at any riot or disturbance in you regiment on or about the 5<sup>th</sup> of Febuary instant.
- A nswer : I was, about the time it was quelled.
- <u>Question</u>: State what you know of said riot and of the connection of the accused with the same.
- <u>A nswer</u>: A bout all I know is that when I got there it was pretty near through. Corporal Frances, the accused, said "come boys, get your guns", as near as I can recollect "and let us take up the post". That is about all I heard him say. A t that time the

crowd were going back to their tents, scattering off. I don't remember that I heard any others of the crowd make threatening remarks in his presence.

### Cross Examination.

- <u>Question</u>: How long have you been acquainted with the accused and what has been his general character as a Soldier for disipline and duty?
- <u>A nswer</u>: I have been acquainted with him pretty much ever since the regiment has been in service, and so far as I know, he has always been a good soldier.
- <u>Henry J. Clark</u>, <u>Capt. Co. D 7<sup>th</sup> K y. Vols.</u>, a witness for the prosecution was called and sworn.

# Examination in Chief.

- <u>Question</u>: Were you present at any riot in your regiment on or about the 3<sup>d</sup> of Febuary instant?
- A nswer : I was present. if you term it that.
- <u>Question</u>: State what you know of that disturbance and of the accuseds connection with the same?
- A nswer: There was a man tied to a post in the regiment on the evening of the 5<sup>th</sup> instant and the boys of the regiment concluded that the commanding officer had no right to tie men to a post, and to pull the post up. I heard Corporal Francis, the accused say if he could get help he would help pull up the post; that he had been treated bad by Capt. Maret, then commanding the regiment. I thought it was my duty to instruct him and try to get him not to engage in such a scrape, he did not seem to pay any attention to what I said. They did not pull the post up, and I don't know that he went near the post. I did not see him do anything and that was all I heard him say.
- Question : What were the acts of the accused that led you to think he took no notice of what you said to him?
- <u>A nswer</u>: He kept talking, so I understand, after I left. He also kept talking while I was talking to him and said if he could get help he would help pull up the post.

# Questions by the Court.

<u>Question</u>: — Did you see the accused with a gun, when he appealed to the boys to get their guns and help to tear down the post?

A nswer: - I did not.

<u>Question</u>: — A re you a soldier in the service of the U nited States, if so what is your rank and to what company & regiment do you belong?

A nswer: - I am captain of Co. D 7<sup>th</sup> Ky. Vols.

The prosecution closed here.

The defense having no testimony to offer, the court was then cleared for deliberation, and having maturely considered the evidence adduced, find the accused **Corporal Harrison Francis**, Co. D 7<sup>th</sup> Ky. Vols. as follows;

of the Specification - "Guilty"

<u>of the charge</u> – – "Guilty"

and do therfore sentence him Corporal Harrison Francis Co D

7<sup>th</sup> Ky Vols. to be reduced to the ranks as a private soldier and
that he be then confined at hard labor on the "Dry Fortugas" for
the period of one year.
